POPLHLTH 701 Research Methods in Health

15 Points Semesters 1 & 2, 2014

Course Prescription

A comprehensive overview, in relation to health, of theoretical underpinnings of research; the asking of research questions; literature reviews; the design, implementation and appraisal of qualitative and quantitative research; and the writing up and dissemination of research.

Goals of the Course

The course aims to provide students with the basic knowledge and skills needed to critically review, use and conduct research in health.

Learning Outcomes

At the successful completion of this course, the students should be able to:

- Understand basic elements of the language, philosophy and ethics of research;
- Formulate an appropriate research question;
- Further develop a justifiable research question through searching and reviewing literature;
- Describe, apply and evaluate quantitative and qualitative study designs to address the research question;
- Develop a strategy to disseminate knowledge and understanding generated by the research.

Content Outline

The course covers:

An overview of the course workbook, and an introduction to the e-learning management system, called Cecil, and e-learning community, called the HIVE

Research frameworks, theory and ethics

Study questions

Literature reviews

Quantitative study designs, study measures, critical appraisal, and introductory statistics Case studies of two quantitative designs: cross-sectional surveys and randomised controlled trials Qualitative study designs, sampling, data gathering and data analysis Diagnostic tests, dissemination and research proposals.

Learning and Teaching

This is a 15 point Masters level course offered in Semester 1 and Semester 2 in two streams: (1) face to face and (2) distance (within New Zealand). Students are asked to select one of these streams.

Designed for individuals who have no previous or recent training in health research methods, the course provides a foundation (or floor) to knowledge of these methods. It provides entry to other, specialist research courses.

Lessons are taught as eight three-hour sessions for the face to face stream, and individual sets of PowerPoint slides with narration added (on Articulate) for the distance stream. All sessions require previewing of slides, and pre-reading of required texts.
