Incorrect or missing punctuation

Two common punctuation errors:	
Common splices	A comma splice error is the incorrect use of the comma to join two independent clauses:
	e.g. Engineering is a very practical discipline, it is about putting ideas into action.
	e.g. Engineering is about putting ideas into action, this makes it suitable for students who enjoy practical work.
Run-on or fused sentences	A run-on error is where two or more sentences are combined into one sentence without proper punctuation:
	e.g. Engineering is about putting ideas into action ^ therefore it is suitable for students who enjoy practical work.
	e.g. Engineering is a very practical discipline ^ it is about putting ideas into action.
Correcting comma splices and run-on sentences	Separate the two sentences with a full-stop:
	e.g. Engineering is a practical discipline. It is about putting ideas into action.
	Separate the two sentences with a semi-colon (if they are closely related):
	e.g. Engineering is about putting ideas into action; this makes it suitable for students who enjoy practical work.
	(If you are not sure about semi-colons, use a full-stop).
	Use a co-ordinating conjunction : e.g. Engineering is about putting ideas into action, and it is suitable for students who enjoy practical work.
	Use a subordinating conjunction : e.g. Engineering is a very practical discipline because it is about putting ideas into action.
